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Road to Jerusalem

- 20:16-17 sailing to Jerusalem from Miletus
 - He wanted to be in Jerusalem for Pentecost
 - From Miletus he sent his letter to Ephesus (20:17-38)
- 21:1-16 Arrives in Syria
 - Sails from Cos to Rhodes to Patara to Tyre
 - Travels through Ptolemais and Caesarea to Jerusalem
- 21:17-26 Meeting with James and other elders in Jerusalem
 - Report on Paul's ministry (21:19)
 - Discussion of the Jews (21:20-22)
 - Paul encouraged to take a vow (21:23-25)

A city stirred

- 27 When the seven days were almost over, the Jews from Asia, upon seeing him in the temple, began to stir up all the crowd and laid hands on him,
- When the seven days were almost over
 - The seven days of purification from vs.26
 - Was this issue at hand about the Law, or about the culture?
- The Jews from Asia
 - Are these the Jews from 19:9?
 - Are these Jews believers?¹
- This is the man who preaches to all men everywhere against our people and the Law and this place
 - Same accusations as against Stephen in 6:8-14



You don't belong here

- 29 For they had previously seen Trophimus the Ephesian in the city with him, and they supposed that Paul had brought him into the temple.
- Besides he has even brought Greeks into the temple and has defiled this holy place
 - Gentiles were allowed in the outer court, but forbidden inside the wall
- They had previously seen Trophimus the Ephesian in the city with him
 - Trophimus is also mentioned in 20:4 and 2 Timothy 4:20
- They supposed that Paul had brought him into the temple
 - Some form of confirmation bias?
- The people rushed together, and taking hold of Paul they dragged him out of the temple
 - They wanted to keep the bloodshed outside the temple

What has he done?

- 31 While they were seeking to kill him, a report came up to the commander of the Roman cohort that all Jerusalem was in confusion.
- While they were seeking to kill him
 - Defiling the temple was a serious offense in Jewish eyes
 - Apparently, they intended to beat Paul to death (v.32)
- A report came up to the commander of the Roman cohort
 - This commander was Claudius Lysias (23:26)
 - Stationed at the Fortress of Antonia
 - The Romans strongly disliked civil disorder
 - Sixth time Paul had caused a riot
 - See 14:19; 16:19-22; 17:5-8, 13; 19:25-34
- He took along some soldiers and centurions and ran down to them
 - This put a stop to the beating

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Arrested and chained

- 33 Then the commander came up and took hold of him, and ordered him to be bound with two chains; and he began asking who he was and what he had done.
- The commander came up and took hold of him
 - He immediately targets the guy that everyone else is targeting
- He began asking who he was and what he had done
 - No one was able to say definitively what he had done
 - He has Paul sent to the barracks (the Fortress of Antonia)
- When he got to the stairs, he was carried by the soldiers because of the violence of the mob
 - Recalls the anger regarding Jesus Luke 23:18 & John 19:15
 - See also Acts 22:22



A citizen of no obscure city

- 37 As Paul was about to be brought into the barracks, he said to the commander, "May I say something to you?" And he said, "Do you know Greek?
- As Paul was about to be brought into the barracks, he said to the commander, "May I say something to you?"
 - Why does the commander ask Paul if he could speak Greek?
 - He assumed Paul was an Egyptian who had previously stirred up revolt
 - This guy said he would defeat the Romans in Jerusalem
 - Many of his followers, called Assassins, were killed by the Romans
- I am a Jew of Tarsus in Cilicia, a citizen of no insignificant city
 - Being a Jew, he had a right to be in the temple
 - Tarsus was one of three major centers of learning and a free city
- I beg you, allow me to speak to the people
 - He proceeds to speak to the people in Hebrew
