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Paul's Defense


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All Jerusalem is in confusion

- 21:17 Paul arrives in Jerusalem
 - James and the elders note the growing discontent amongst the Jews
 - They recommend that Paul take a vow to appease the Jews
- 21:27 The people drag Paul out of the temple
 - Saying he teaches against the law and the temple
 - Accuse him of bringing a Gentile into the temple
- 21:31 the Roman commander at the temple gets word of the riot
 - Rushes into the temple and seizes Paul
 - Unable to determine what the issue is
 - Initially thought Paul was an Egyptian revolutionary
 - Carries Paul towards the fortress
- 21:37 Paul asks to speak from the fortress steps
 - Speaks to the crowd in Aramaic (though the text says Hebrew)
 - Important point is that it is a language the Jews would speak

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Paul's Defense

Such was I

- 1 "Brethren and fathers, hear my defense which I now offer to you."
- Brethren and fathers
 - He starts from a place of commonality and fraternity
 - The people listen closely because he is speaking in Hebrew/Aramaic
- Paul's curriculum vitae
 - Jewish by birth
 - Citizen of Tarsus in Cilicia
 - A student of Gamaliel
 - The most highly regarded teacher of the day
 - According to a strict manner of the law
 - Zealous of God
 - Acknowledges the are coming from a place of zeal
 - Persecuted "the Way"
 - Even to the point of killing those involved
 - Binding and delivering to prison both men and women

The road to Damascus

- 6 "But it happened that as I was on my way, approaching Damascus about noontime, a very bright light suddenly flashed from heaven all around me,"
- But it happened that as I was on my way
 - He was going to Damascus to arrest other Christians
 - Those with him saw the light, but did not understand the voice
 - This was a personal call
 - What would the light signify to the Jewish ears?
- And I said, What shall I do, Lord
 - Paul demonstrates his obedient response to the call of the Lord
 - Through all this, he is showing the Jews that he is not acting on his own

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A devout man (according to the law)

- 11 "But since I could not see because of the brightness of that light, I was led by the hand by those who were with me and came into Damascus."
- But since I could not see because of the brightness of that light
 - What is significant about Paul's blindness?
- And one Ananias
 - He was devout by the standard of the law
 - He was highly regarded by the Jews
 - He gave Paul back his sight¹
- And he said, The God of our fathers appointed you to know his will
 - To see the Righteous One
 - To hear a voice from his mouth
 - You will be a witness

• Get up and be baptized, and wash away your sins, calling on His name

I fell into a trance

- 17 "It happened when I returned to Jerusalem and was praying in the temple, that I fell into a trance,"
- And saw him saying to me
 - Who is "him"?
 - Does this refer back to verse 14?
 - Note that this takes place in the temple
- Make haste, and get out of Jerusalem quickly
 - "He" prophesied that the Jews would not accept his witness
- Paul defends himself before God
 - I used to imprison and beat those who believed in You
 - I also was standing by approving [of the stoning of Stephen]
 - In other words, Paul was zealous for the law
- Go! For I will send you far away to the Gentiles
 - See also Acts 9:15

Mob justice

- 22 They listened to him up to this statement, and then they raised their voices and said, "Away with such a fellow from the earth, for he should not be allowed to live!"
- They listened to him up to this statement
 - What didn't they like about this statement?
 - Had they already judged Paul?
- Away with such a fellow from the earth
 - Is there more going on here than just zeal for the law and the temple
- What happens next?
 - About to be flogged, Paul declares his Roman citizenship
 - Paul goes before the Jewish council
 - The Jews plot to kill Paul
 - Paul goes before the Roman governor
 - Paul appeals to Caesar

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
