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Suffering & Death

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Because of Christ

- 1 Therefore, since Christ has suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same purpose, because he who has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin,
- Therefore¹
 - Christ died and was buried and rose again
 - Through which we are saved and are brought back to God
- since Christ has suffered in the flesh
 - ► Suffered used for the believer in 2:19,20,21,23; 3:14,17; 4:15,19; 5:10
 - Christ's suffering ended in death
 - Why does Peter keep bringing up back to Christ's suffering?
 - ★ To give perspective?
 - ★ To provide endurance?
 - How is Christ's suffering relevant to us today²?
 - ★ See 4:13

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Bearing arms

- 1 Therefore, since Christ has suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same purpose, because he who has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin,
- Arm yourself
 - Derived from word used in Luke 11:21
 - A principle of preparation
 - ★ Similar entreaties to preparation in 1:13 & 4:7 & 5:8
 - ★ Ephesians 6:13 the full armor of God
- Same purpose
 - Same word in Hebrews 4:12 ...intentions of the heart.
 - Similar to Philippians 2:5 the attitude of Christ
 - What was Christ's purpose in enduring suffering?
 - ★ 2:24 that we might be healed
 - ★ 3:18 that he might bring us back to God
 - What does all that have to do with our suffering?
 - ★ Our suffering can³ point to Christ's See 2:12

Dead to rights

- 1 Therefore, since Christ has suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same purpose, because he who has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin,
- The Flesh
 - Same word used 3:18 & 21
 - $\star~$ Used throughout the NT as well
 - Is this the old man, or the physical body?⁴
- Ceased from sin⁵
 - I John 3:6 No one who abides in Him sins
 - See pretty much all of Paul⁶'s writings, specifically Romans 6:1-7
 - Does this mean suffering purges us from sin?⁷
 - ★ What role does suffering play in our spiritual growth?
 - ★ Is Peter even talking about spiritual growth here?

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We live!

- 2 so as to live the rest of the time in the flesh no longer for the lusts of men, but for the will of God
- so as to live the rest of the time in the flesh
 - This is certainly referring to our earthly existence
 - Seems clear God has a plan and purpose for us once we are saved⁸
 - What ends the rest of the time?
 - ★ 2:12 the day of visitation⁹
- no longer for the lusts of men
 - This is a regular warning from Peter
 - ★ 1:14 & 2:11 the passions of the flesh
 - How might these lusts manifest themselves as we respond to suffering/persecution?¹⁰
 - $\star~2{:}1^{11}$ malice and deceit and hypocrisy and envy and slander

So it goes

- 2 so as to live the rest of the time in the flesh no longer for the lusts of men, **but for the will of God**
- Peter's broad thoughts on the will of God¹²
 - ▶ 1:3-5 God has given us hope and inheritance
 - 1:14-16 God's holiness demand ours
- Peter's thoughts on the will of God specific to suffering/persecution
 - 2:21-23 respond to suffering as Christ did
 - ★ Reiterated in 3:9 decidedly NOT "eye for an eye"
 - 4:19 suffering can be part of God's will¹³
 - ▶ 5:10 Christ will perfect, confirm, strengthen and establish you
 - $\star\,$ Peter bookends his epistle with assurances of our future resurrection

• Summary: suffering/persecution is an essential & unavoidable aspect of the Christian's life

- ▶ 4:12 ...do not be surprised...
- John 15:18 the world hates you because it hates Christ

- 3 For the time already past is sufficient for you to have carried out the desire of the Gentiles, having pursued a course of sensuality, lusts, drunkenness, carousing, drinking parties and abominable idolatries.
- For the time already past¹⁴
 - ▶ 1:14-17 ...passions of your former ignorance...
 - ► 2:10 ...now you have received mercy...
- Sufficient
 - Matthew 6:34 Each day has enough troubles
 - Clearly, we should engage in a certain amount of debauchery¹⁵
- the desires of the Gentiles
 - Is this referring to the earthly people group?
 - ► Contrast with 2:9 ...you are a chosen people...

3 For the time already past is sufficient for you to have carried out the desire of the Gentiles, having pursued a course of sensuality, lusts, drunkenness, carousing, drinking parties and abominable idolatries.

• What is the "way of the Gentile"?

- tl;dr unbridled hedonism
- sensuality unbridled lust, excess, licentiousness, lasciviousness, wantonness, outrageousness, shamelessness, insolence
- Iusts desire, craving, longing, desire for what is forbidden, lust
- drunkenness i.e. excess
- carousing a.k.a. a Bacchanal
- drinking parties see above
- abominable¹⁶ idolatries the vices springing from idolatry and peculiar to it
- How does this fit in with our¹⁷ responding to persecution?
