




- I Corinth 16:1-4 "Now concerning the collection for the saints, as I have given orders to the churches of Galatia, so you must do also: On the first day of the week let each one of you lay something aside, storing up as he may prosper, that there be no collections when I come. And when I come, whomever you approve by your letters I will send to bear your gift to Jerusalem. But if it is fitting that I go also, they will go with me."
 - Doctrine is over!
 - Is this section necessary?
 - Yes, the personal reflections helps to validate scripture.
 - A message to the church gong forward.
 - Paul is in Ephesus, where his presence was needed, and expected to go to Macedonia, probably to obtain support. He



was not going to go to Corinth on his way but on his return, but this was not his original intention (*II Cor 1:15-17*).










The First Epistle to the Corinthians





- was not going to go to Corinth on his way but on his return, but this was not his original intention (*II Cor 1:15-17*).
 - And support is something he promised, and particularly at a time when Jewish believers were forced to leave Jerusalem (*Acts 8:1*) and their was reportedly a famine in Palestine (*Acts 11:28*).
 - A similar message had been given to the churches in Galatia and Rome.
 - » Gal: 2:10, Rom 15:26
 - » And note, this is for the *saints*, not the poor!
- Notice *first day of the week* and the accountability of *each one of you*.
 - *lay aside* present active imperative
 - storing up as he may prosper
 - Amount differs but planning to give seems intended.
 - » II Cor 8:12 For if there is first a willing mind, *it is* accepted according to what one has, *and* not according to what he does not have
 - Is this tithing, and if not what is the principle of our giving?
 - » II Cor 9:7 So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver.



- *that there be no collections when I come* he anticipated the need.
 - In verse 1, 'the' collection.
- *whomever you approve by your letters* designee, treasurer?
 - Letters were presumably to Paul indicating who was assuming the responsibility of overseeing this matter.
- But if it is fitting that I go also, they will go with me.
 - Isn't this the practical side of life, i.e. it all depends doesn't it, and may the Lord guide in such decisions to follow.
- I Corinth 16:5-9 "Now I will come to you when I pass through Macedonia (for I am passing through Macedonia). And it may be that I will remain, or even spend the winter with you, that you may send me on my journey, wherever I go. For I do not wish to see you now on the way; but I hope to stay a while with you, if the Lord permits. But I will tarry in Ephesus until



Pentecost. For a great and effective door has opened to me, and there are many adversaries."

- More uncertainty as to what will transpire.
 - His intention was to *pass through Macedonia*, and presumably he did so but not momentarily but during the *winter* months (*Acts 20:3,6*).
 - Note, and if the Lord permits!
 - James 4:13-15 Some now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will[fn] go to such and such a city, spend a year there, buy and sell, and make a profit"; whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away. Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we shall live and do this or that."
 - Think of our own lives; we make plans but then they're changed and where's God in all of this?
 - Rom 8:28,29 And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose. For whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, that He might be the firstborn among many brethren.



The First Epistle to the Corinthians

- Why await *Pentecost*?
 - The timing would be right to be part of the Jewish festival which occurred fifty days after the Passover.
 - Perhaps weather conditions that may have been more appropriate for that time of year.
 - The opportunities that awaited him *a great and effective door has opened to me, and there are many adversaries.*
 - Acts 20:16 For Paul had decided to sail past Ephesus, so that he would not have to spend time in Asia; for he was hurrying to be at Jerusalem, if possible, on the Day of Pentecost.
 - And after the uproar of Demetrius (*adversary*) Paul would ultimately leave Ephesus (*Acts 19:1-41, 20:1*).
- Define an *effective door*, more accurately defined as *effectual*.
 - *Phm 1:6 That the communication of thy faith may become effectual by the acknowledging of every good thing which is in you in Christ Jesus.*
 - *Ephesus* would be one place, and he tarried there until much in the way of spreading the gospel was accomplished.
