1 Peter 2:24 (KJV) Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed.

Bare = carried up ἀνήνεγκεν verb agrist active ind 3s Literally: Who, He Himself, carried up our sins in His own body on the wood

Isaiah 53:4-6 (KJV) 4 Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. 5 But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed. 6 All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all.

Literally: so that, to the sins we having died, to the righteousness we may live

whose = **by whose** relative pronoun genitive masculine sing referring to Christ in v21

stripes = the wound noun dative masc singular $\tau \tilde{\omega} \mu \hat{\omega} \lambda \omega \pi \iota$ This wound is first mentioned to Satan in Gen 3:15 And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt <u>bruise</u> his heel.

ye were healed = you were healed verb indicative agrist passive 2p plural ιάθητε

Isaiah 53:5, states, "...by His scourging we are healed." The healing work in the passage is in regard to spiritual salvation, not physical healing.

Literally: for by His wound you were healed.



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1 Peter 2:25 (KJV) For ye were as sheep going astray; but are now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls.

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1 Peter 2:24-25 (KJV)

Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed.

For ye were as sheep going astray; but are now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls.

Literally: Who, He Himself, carried up our sins in His own body on the wood, so that, to the sins we having died, to the righteousness we may live, for by His wound you were healed.

Because you were being like sheep, being led astray, but you were turned back unto the Shepherd and Guardian of your souls.
