

Statements about the pride in the Corinthian Church

• You are already filled (perfect tense)

[You behave as if] you are already filled and think you have enough [you are full and content, feeling no need of anything more]! Amplified

• You have already become rich

Already you have become rich [in spiritual gifts and graces]! [Without any counsel or instruction from us, in your conceit]

Amplified

You have become kings <u>without us</u>

You have ascended your thrones and come into your kingdom without including us! Amplified

- Paul will also describe his life as an apostle.

Subject: God [He is the one who is producing the action] Verb: has exhibited – to show forth D.O. : us (the apostles)

last of all - eschatos - of apostles as "last" in the program ofa spectacular displayVine

 - as men condemned to death
 - condemned to death epithanatios doomed to death
 - Rom 8:36 Just as it is written, "for your sake we are being <u>put to death</u> all day long; we were considered as sheep to be slaughtered."
 - Paul tells us this in the context of who will separate us from the love of Christ. (Rom 8:35)
 - In Roman processionals, criminals who were condemned to death were <u>at the end</u> of the processional. McCalley

- because we (apostles) have become a spectacle to the world
- spectacle *theatron* theater, a place where drama and other public spectacles were exhibited
- Heb 10:32 But remember the former days, when, after being enlightened, you endured a great conflict of sufferings, ^{33a} partly by being made a public <u>spectacle</u> through reproaches and tribulations ---
- both to angels and to men
- angels observe the activities of believers and desire to understand God's salvation of man 1 Peter 1:12

we = apostles; you = Corinthians (how they saw themselves)

we are fools for Christ's sake, but you are prudent in Christ

- 1 Cor 1:18 For the "word of the cross" is <u>foolishness</u> to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.
- The doctrine (word) of the cross is the teaching that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, died a death wherein the guilt and penalty of man's sin was placed on Him, making it possible for salvation to be extended to those who believe in Christ.

prudent – wise - 1 Cor 3:18 Let no man deceive himself. If any man among you <u>thinks that he is wise</u> in this age, he must become foolish, so that he may become wise. ¹⁰ We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are prudent in Christing we are weak, but you are strong; you are distinguished, but we are without honor.

we are weak, but you are strong

2 Cor 12:10 Therefore I am well content with <u>weaknesses</u>, with insults, with distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties, for Christ's sake; for when <u>I am weak</u>, then I am strong.

strong - *ischyros* - the church at Corinth, 1 Cor. 4:10, where the Apostle reproaches them ironically with their unspiritual and self-complacent condition

But as for all of you, you are those who are mighty. Wuest

distinguished - held in honor

1 Cor 1:12 Now I mean this, that each one of you is saying, "I am of Paul," and "I of Apollos," and "I of Cephas," and "I of Christ."

without honor

John 4:44 For Jesus Himself testified that a prophet has no honor in his own country.

- ¹¹ <u>To this present hour we are both hungry and thirsty, and are poorly clothed</u>, and are roughly treated, and are homeless;
 - Paul now enumerates the items of the apostle's suffering.
 - to this present (or very) hour
 - This is the present condition of Paul.
 - These items that follow are the basic needs of life:
 - we are both hungry and thirsty and are poorly clothed we have gone both hungry and thirsty; we [habitually] wear but one undergarment [and shiver in the cold] Amplified

Next we have how Paul was treated by most people.

(we) are roughly treated, and are homeless

maltreated and, going from place to place, we have no fixed home Wuest

2 Cor 11:27 *I have been* in labor and hardship, through many sleepless nights, in hunger and thirst, often without food, in cold and exposure.

Now Paul continues with his description of his apostleship

• we toil, working with our own hands

Acts 18:3 and because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them and they were working, for by trade they were tent-makers.

• when we are reviled, we bless

1 Peter 3:9 not returning evil for evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead; for you were called for the very purpose that you might inherit a blessing.

John 15:20a "Remember the word that I said to you, 'A slave is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted Me, they will also persecute you;"

• when we are slandered, we try to conciliate

When we are slandered and defamed, we [try to] answer softly and bring comfort. Amplified

Prov 15:1 A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.

We have become in the estimation of the world as the filth discarded by humanity as the result of cleansing one's self, dirt scraped off of all things, to this very moment.

Now let us review why Paul would receive such a treatment at the hands of the Corinthian church!

^{2:1} And when I came to you, brethren, I did not come with superiority of speech or of wisdom, proclaiming to you the testimony of God.



and when I came to you, brethren, proclaiming to you the testimony of God

proclaiming - katangellō - to declare, proclaim (or preach)

testimony – *mystērion* – the New Testament use of the term relates it to some work or purpose of God hitherto unrevealed

• The gospel was both the message God had previously not revealed that the apostles made known and the message to which they bore witness. Constable ^{2:1} And when I came to you, brethren, <u>I did not</u> <u>come with superiority of speech or of wisdom,</u> proclaiming to you the testimony of God.



- I did not come with superiority of speech or of wisdom.
- with kata according to

superiority - hyperochē - meaning superiority, excellence

The --- expression (speech) refers to rhetorical skill and has to do with his method of preaching. McCalley

wisdom – sophia – speaking of man's wisdom here

 We saw this word in 1 Cor 1:17 not in cleverness (wisdom) of speech, so that the cross of Christ would not be made void. ^{2:2} For I determined to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and Him crucified.



- Now we will see Paul's true focus with the Corinthiar
- For I determined to know nothing among you
- determined $krin\bar{o}$ to determine, resolve, decree
- As far as his preaching went, Paul only spoke about Christ crucified. This was his regular practice (Gal. 3). He left all other knowledge aside.
- The next part of the verse tells us what Paul had resolved to preach.

- except (to know) Jesus Christ, and Him crucified The person of Jesus Christ
- Christ is both with God and is God; Christ is the creator of all things; in Christ is life and that life is the light of men; Christ is the image of the invisible God.

The work of Jesus Christ

Died for all sins:

- Christ is the propitiation (satisfaction) for our sins; and not for ours only, but also for those of the whole world.
 Died unto the sin (nature):
- He died with respect to our sinful nature once for all.
- God having sent His own Son --- as an offering for sin, He condemned the sinful nature in the flesh.
