

For you tolerate it if anyone enslaves you, [if] anyone advantage of you, [if] anyone takes advantage of you, [if] anyone exalts himself, [if] anyone hits you in the face. For you tolerate it [actions of the false apostles]

- This is second time he has used the word "tolerate."
- Also each of the five statements has an "if" associated with them, and they are all "assumed to be true."
- if anyone enslaves you makes slaves of you and controls you
- Gal 2:4 But it was because of the false brethren secretly brought in, --- in order to <u>bring us into bondage</u>.
 [if] anyone devours you to gobble you up [your substance, spends your money]
- Luke 15:30 but when this son of yours came, who has devoured your wealth ---, you killed the fattened calf for him.

²⁰ For you tolerate it if anyone enslaves you, [if] anyone a devours you, [if] anyone takes advantage of you, [if] anyone exalts himself, [if] anyone hits you in the face.

[if] anyone takes advantage of you – captures you, preys
 upon you, or deceives you
 Matt 23:14a Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites

- Matt 23:14a Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites, because you devour widows' houses.
 [if] anyone exalts himself to lift yourself over someone
- 2 Cor 10:5 We are destroying speculations and every lofty thing raised up against the knowledge of God.

[if] anyone hits you in the face – to put people down by insult [physically or by speech*]

- This happened physically to Paul in Acts 23:2.
- All these actions are a disgrace and you should know better.

^{21a} To my shame I must say that we have been weak by comparison.



Now, Paul will lay this disgrace on himself !

Lit: I speak according to dishonor as we ourselves have been weak*

dishonor - atimia – shame, disgrace; it is used of selfdisparagement in 2 Cor 11:21

- This is total irony! we did not act in this manner.*
- 1 Cor 2:3 I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling.
- 2 Cor 10:1 Now I, Paul, myself urge you by the meekness and gentleness of Christ—I who am meek when face to face with you, but bold toward you when absent !
- We did not act like authoritative apostles.* * Merryman

Today's verses

But in whatever way anyone may be daring Interlinear Verb - may be daring - *tolmáō* - to have courage, boldness, confidence to do something

- The false apostles had plenty of daring or boldness, but this was the disguise they wore as servants of Satan.
- in foolishness I speak
- Even though Paul knew that human boasting was foolishness, he felt it necessary to make his point.
- I [Paul] also am daring

verb – am daring – tolmao – the idea is boldness

• After repeated warnings that he was going to boast (10:8; 11:1, 6, 16), Paul now finally began. Constable

²² Are they Hebrews? So am I. Are they Israelites? So am I. Are they descendants of Abraham? So am I. Paul starts his list of items to boast about with a comparison to the false apostles, i.e. So am I.

Are they Hebrews? So am I.

- A Hebrew of Hebrews
- It looks very much as if Paul's opponents at Corinth were of Jewish origin.
 Barnett via Constable

Are they Israelites? So am I.

- Circumcised the eighth day, of the nation of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin.
- Are they descendants [seed] of Abraham? So am I.
- Paul traced his descent all the way back to Abraham.*
- Gal 3:16a Now the promises were spoken to Abraham and to his seed.

²³ <u>Are they servants of Christ?—I speak as if insane—I</u> <u>more so</u>; in far more labors, in far more imprisonments, beaten times without number, often in danger of death. The next part of his list is about items that he was <u>above</u> measure of these false apostles, i.e. I more so.

Are they [the false apostles] servants of Christ?

- Paul's rhetorical question expects a <u>no</u> answer.
- Of course they are not servants of Christ.

I [Paul] more so

- I beyond them or I above measure.
 Merryman/Darby
- Now Paul will now list how his service for Christ was "above measure" of the false apostles.

• in far more [abundant] labors

labors – kopos – to labor to the point of exhaustion

- 1 Thess 2:9 For you recall, brethren, <u>our labor</u> and hardship, how working night and day so as not to be a burden to any of you.
- in far more [frequent] imprisonments
- The book of Acts shows us some of those:*
- Acts 16 was imprisoned at Philippi
- Acts 22 was imprisoned at Jerusalem
- Acts 23 was imprisoned at Caesarea
- Also imprisoned at Rome two times

Next he talks about his <u>being beaten</u>:

beaten times without number,

• In stripes inflicted by being whipped, beyond measure.

Amplified

often in danger of death

- These beatings put Paul in a real danger of death.
- Next we are told how he was beaten.
- ²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews thirty-nine lashes.
- This was an official synagogue punishment.*
- Deut 25:3 He may beat him forty times, but no more.

²⁵ <u>Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned</u>, **HBC** three times I was shipwrecked, a night and a day I have spent in the deep.

Now, more on beatings and punishments:

Three times I was beaten with rods

- This was a Gentile mode of punishment. McCalley
- Acts 16:22 The crowd rose up together against them, and the chief magistrates tore their robes off them and proceeded to order them [Paul and Silas] to be <u>beaten</u> with rods.

once I was stoned

 Acts 14:19 But Jews came from Antioch and Iconium, and having won over the crowds, they <u>stoned</u> Paul and dragged him out of the city, supposing him to be dead. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, <u>HIBC</u> <u>three times I was shipwrecked, a night and a day I have</u> <u>spent in the deep</u>.

three times I was shipwrecked

- Nine voyages Paul made by ship in the book of Acts.
 McCalley
- Paul had already experienced shipwreck three times by now, though Luke recorded none of these in Acts.*

a night and a day I have spent in the deep

- Paul's night and day in the sea also comes as news to the reader of Acts.*
- Obviously in Acts Luke gave us only a highly selective account of the Apostle Paul's very difficult life.*

²⁶ <u>*I have been* on frequent journeys, in dangers from</u> <u>rivers, dangers from robbers, dangers from *my* <u>countrymen</u>, dangers from the Gentiles, dangers in the city, dangers in the wilderness, dangers on the sea, dangers among false brethren.</u>

I have been on frequent journeys

- Next, a list of the dangers from Paul's many journeys: in dangers from rivers
- no dangers from rivers mentioned in Acts or Epistles
 [in] dangers from robbers
- no dangers from robbers mentioned in Acts or Epistles
- Barabbas was called a robber in John 18:40.
 [in] dangers from my countrymen
 - Acts 9:22 But Saul kept increasing in strength and confounding the Jews who lived at Damascus by proving that this Jesus is the Christ. ²³ When many days had elapsed, <u>the Jews plotted together to do away with him</u>.

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²⁶ I have been on frequent journeys, in dangers from rivers, dangers from robbers, dangers from my countrymen, <u>dangers from the Gentiles, dangers in the</u> <u>city, dangers in the wilderness, dangers on the sea,</u> <u>dangers among false brethren</u>.



[in] dangers from the Gentiles

 Acts 16:22 The crowd rose up together against them, and the chief magistrates [of Thyatira] tore their robes off them and proceeded to order them to be beaten with rods.

[in] dangers in the city

Jerusalem, Thyatira, Ephesus and many more

 [in] dangers in the wilderness - not mentioned elsewhere
 [in] dangers on the sea - Paul is shipwrecked during a voyage to Rome in Acts 27.


[in] dangers among false brethren – the false apostles

²⁷ *I have been* in labor and hardship, through many sleepless nights, in hunger and thirst, often without food, in cold and exposure.

- Next Paul will tell us about his personal adversity:
 I have been in labor and hardship
- 1 Thess 2:9 For you recall, brethren, <u>our labor and hardship</u>, how working night and day so as not to be a burden to any of you, we proclaimed to you the gospel of God.
- through many sleepless nights
 2 Cor 6:5 in beatings, in imprisonments, in the second seco
 - 2 Cor 6:5 in beatings, in imprisonments, in tumults, in labors, in sleeplessness, in hunger,
 - in hunger and thirst, often without food
 - same as above
 - in cold and exposure
 - Rom 8:35 Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or <u>nakedness</u>, or peril, or sword?

²⁸ Apart from *such* external things, there is the daily pressure on me *of* concern for all the churches.


Now Paul speaks of internal pressure:



concern - *merimna* - that which causes a care, especially an anxious care

- The pressure, day after day, namely, my anxiety for all the assemblies. Wuest
- Some have said that Paul only started 14 churches in his lifetime.*
- If so that is a remarkable thing, but I tend to think there are more than 14.*
