

Romans 14:1-4 The Strong Believer and the Weak Believer



The Chapter 13 to 14 Transition*

- Chapter 13 dealt with living in the world as a Christian
 - Paul counseled submission to human government
 - Love for all people while we actively wait for our Lord to appear
- Chapter 14 is about how should we conduct ourselves among other believers
 - When our interpretation of God's will conflicts with that of another believer
 - Paul explained how believers can disagree on nonessentials and still maintain unity in the church

Chapter 14 Overview of verses 1-12

Key Points by McCalley

- The weak believer was the one who had associated what we would call a neutral thing (i.e. meat) with an idol.
- The strong believer was the one who said it's only a thing (i.e. meat).
- The question is how are these two believers to relate to one another?

Outline by D.J. Moo

- This paragraph divides into three sections: vv. 1-3, 4-9, and 10-12.
- The divisions between the sections are marked with similar rhetorical questions [Who or Why].

Outline by D.J. Moo (cont.)

- Who are you who is judging the servant of another?
 (v. 4a)
- Why are you judging your brother? (v. 10a)
- The first (vv. 1-3) and the third (vv. 10-12) state in almost identical language the main point of the paragraph:
- The strong are not to have "contempt" of the weak;
 the weak are not to "judge" the strong (vv. 3a and 10a).
- In the central section, vv. 4-9: Paul provides the theological foundation for these commands:
- Every Christian is a servant of the Lord; and it is to that master [Jesus Christ] and not to any other fellow servant, that the believer must answer.

Today's Verses

- ¹ Now accept the one who is weak in faith, *but* not ¹ for *the purpose of* passing judgment on his opinions.
- ² One person has faith that he may eat all things, but he who is weak eats vegetables *only*.

Now, the one being weak in the faith, [you] receive, not for passing judgment on reasonings Interlinear

now - de – connective - new topic in living the Christian life [you] receive - proslambanō – lit: to take to oneself

- present tense continuous action
- imperative God's will
- middle voice for your own benefit
- signifying a special interest on the part of the receiver [the strong believer], suggesting a welcome Vine

the one being weak

a believer with a conscience issue

being weak - astheneō - to lack strength [of his conscience]

- next we have the modifying words "in the faith"
- the faith is the body of truth given to the church [body of Christ] by the apostles
- Jude 1:3b I [Jude] felt the necessity to write to you appealing that you contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all handed down to the saints.
- So the one being weak is:*
 - Not strong in his beliefs
 - Not rooted and grounded in Christian teaching

But he is not to be criticized for it!

hapax – once for all delivered

and perpetual validity

- Now accept the one who is weak in faith, <u>but not for the purpose of passing judgment on his opinions</u>. [you receive] not for passing judgment on reasonings Interlinear
 - Now we are given a warning about our interaction with the weaker brother
- the strong believer is to do as follows:
- not for lit: not with a view to
 passing judgment on [weak believer] reasonings/opinions
- [not to be] a critical analysis of his inward reasonings wuest
- The weak believers' opinions or reasonings are most often wrong* - see Rom 1:21, 1 Cor 3:21
- So the weak believer had the wrong opinion about what he was eating*
- We are to accept the person, but not the opinion* *McCalley

One man indeed [Gr. men] believes to eat all things, but [Gr. de] the one being weak eats vegetables Interlinear

- men on the one hand [point]
- de on the other hand [counterpoint]

point: one man indeed [men] believes to eat all things

- one man in context the strong believer
- pistis [faith] to Paul was essentially a just principle from the word of God

to eat all [pas] things

² One person has faith that he may eat all things, but he who is weak eats vegetables *only*.

counterpoint: but [de] the one being weak eats vegetables

- the one the weak believer
- being weak astheneō to doubt, to hesitate, to vacillate present tense – continuous action
- spoken of those whose minds are easily disturbed Vine
- eats esthiō "to eat" (as distinct from pinō, "to drink")
- vegetables lachanon literally a plant in tilled ground, hence a garden plant, herb
- indicating that the one to whom Paul has reference was a vegetarian*
- The weak believer was a product of an inadequate understanding of God's Word and an over-sensitized conscience.*

- The one who eats is not to regard with contempt the one who does not eat, and the one who does not eat is not to judge the one who eats, for God has accepted him.
 - Now Paul gives us God's principle for living the Christian life:
 - This principle applies to both "the one who eats" and "the one who does not eat"

1st - The one who eats

is <u>not</u> to regard with contempt - exoutheneō - to make of no account, to regard as nothing, to despise utterly

- this is <u>not</u> to be the continuous action of the strong
- Luke 23:11a And Herod, with his soldiers, treated Him [Jesus] with contempt and mocked Him...

the one who does not eat – the weak brother

The one who eats is not to regard with contempt the one who does not eat, and the one who does not eat is not to judge the one who eats, for God has accepted him.



2nd - the one who does not eat

is <u>not</u> to judge – *krinō* - to judge in the sense of to criticize

- again this is to be the continuous action of the weak
- John 7:24 Do not judge according to appearance, but judge with righteous judgment.

the one who eats – the strong brother

- Paul follows this statement with more teaching about the strong believer*
- There is a reason why we are not to judge the strong believer*

The one who eats is not to regard with contempt the one who does not eat, and the one who does not eat is not to judge the one who eats, for God has accepted him.



for God has received Him

Interlinear

- from the verse we can see that this is speaking about the strong brother
- received proslambanōto take to oneself: middle voice: signifying a special interest on the part of the receiver, and agrist tense
- The agrist points to a definite time [event] when he believed on Christ
- This is what the weak believer is to understand about the strong believer

Who are you the one judging a household servant belonging to another Interlinear

who are you – who is Paul speaking to?

- [the one] judging krinō to judge in the sense of to criticize (again this is a continuous action)
- now Paul will describe the strong believer in two ways:
- a household servant oikétēs a domestic servant
- 1 Pet 2:18a Servants, be submissive to your masters with all respect.
- belonging to another *allotrios* belonging to another [i.e. not your servant]

own master he stands or falls; and he will stand, for the

To his own master he stands or falls

master - kyrios - a lord, one who exercises power

- notice it is to his own [ho] master
- this is a definite article which makes it a specific master

he stands - stēkō - figuratively, where the context indicates the meaning "standeth upright"

[he] falls - piptō - of persons, in falling morally or spiritually

The strong's master is responsible for what happens to him

and he will stand

and or but – de – sharp contrast

will stand - histēmi - to cause to stand; in the passive voice, "to be made to stand" – future tense

- Paul assures the weaker brother that the stronger brother would stand approved by God
- indeed, he shall be made to stand

 Wuest
- Jude 1:24 Now to Him who is able to keep you from stumbling, and to make you stand in the presence of His glory blameless with great joy.

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
for the Lord is able to make him stand

- for the Lord the Lord is one performing the action
- is able dynateō to be mighty, to show oneself powerful
- to make him stand histēmi to cause to stand
 [aorist, an event]
- This is a declaration of the Lord's power in making the believer stand

Final Thoughts*

- It is his own [the believer's] Lord who is concerned.
- It is His [the Lord's] interest which is involved.
- And to Him [the Lord], not to others, he [the believer] must answer as he stands or falls.
- But [indeed] he shall be made to stand.
