Roger noted last week that the Greek form of this verb "declared righteous," or "justified," is not the present participle, "being declared righteous,"

but rather the aorist participle, "having been declared righteous," or "justified."

What is the difference?

- "being declared righteous" looks to a condition you are in;
- "having been declared righteous" looks back to a fact that happened.
- The moment you believed, God declared you righteous, never to change His mind:

The Epistle to the Romans takes on a new aspect of understanding in each chapter:

- In Chapter Three, Christ was set forth as a propitiation for our sins;
 - in Chapter Four, Christ was raised for our justification;
 - in Chapter Five, we have peace with God through Christ, a position in grace, and the hope of the coming glory.

We have three blessings, then, in this first part of our chapter:

- 1. Peace with God, in looking back to Calvary where Christ made peace by His blood.
- 2. A present standing (position) in grace, in unlimited Divine favor; and
- 3. Hope of the glory of God—of being glorified with Christ when He comes.

Tribulations' School

"Tribulation works patience, proven character."

The Father's school of tribulations is very distasteful to the natural heart. But His same wondrous love and grace, which has secured for us above an inalienably safe portion, blessings ordained from eternity and secured for eternity, have also to carry on a work within us. - The very first action of the Holy Spirit in your heart is to assure you that God loves you.
- Many believers are hindered by being occupied with his own feelings.
- The unmistakable mark of your having the Holy Spirit is that God is before you.
- The only bond with Christ is the Spirit of God. "If anyone has not the Spirit of Christ he is not of him" (Romans 8:9); it is not "none of his" but "not of him".

What is the proof that you believe in Christ risen?

The proof that you believe in Christ risen, and that is that you have received the Holy Spirit.

- "He that is joined to the Lord is one Spirit" (1 Cor. 6:17); that is your responsibility of faith. You belong to the Lord. "In whom also after that ye believed, ye were sealed" (Ephesians 1:13).

Now what is the attitude of our souls towards tribulations?

- *Naturally* we shrink from them and would avoid them if possible; we would wish to be relieved of pressures. But spiritually we boast in tribulations.
- The believer who has peace towards God through our Lord Jesus Christ, and who is standing in a blessed sense of how favorable God is to him, has the <u>inward conviction that tribulation is a spiritual advantage</u>; it works endurance i.e., load carrying ability.
- I do not think anyone will "boast" in tribulations until he has found them to be spiritually advantageous.
- Tribulation, or pressure, *gone through with God* has the effect of developing a precious **quality of Christ** in the saints. Coates

What an amazing fruit of God's grace, and of redemption accomplished! The Holy Spirit has been given to us!
