

- Rom 8:23 ASV "And not only so, but ourselves also, who have the first-fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for [our] adoption, [to wit], the redemption of our body."
 - 'And not only so' implies something before, 'but ourselves also' to what does this refer?
 - the creation and believers
 - We are described as having 'the first-fruits of the Spirit'
 - What are the *first-fruits*?
 - The first portion of the dough, from which sacred loaves were to be prepared –
 Lev 23:10,11, Num 28:26
 - » Thus, used of persons consecrated to God for all time.
 - Persons superior in excellence to others of the same class
 - What does this mean here?
 - James 1:18 'Of His own will begot He us with the word of truth, that we



- should be a kind of first-fruits of his creatures.'
 - » a pledge of a rich and full harvest sacred and dedicated
- Remember, we are 'sons', 'heirs', 'joint-heirs' Rom 8:14-17
- 'we groan (present tense) within ourselves'
 - In v 22, we saw that the whole creation 'groaned and travailed in pain together until now'
 - In the Greek, 'groan' can also be interpreted as 'sigh' how would you describe 'groan' to someone?
 - In the English, implies strife and pain
 - Is that our condition now? Should it be?
 - But what are we groaning for here and now?
 - The adoption
 - » I thought we were already adopted sons?



- Here, the adoption is the 'redemption of the body'
 - » Redemption deliverance
- II Cor 5:2 'For in this we groan, earnestly desiring to be clothed upon with our house which is from heaven:'
 - » This is not the deliverance of ourselves from our bodies, but the redemption of our bodies from the grave.
- 'redemption of the body' is part of the entire adoption deal
 - » Rom 8:15 'For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, Abba, Father.'
 - » 1 Pet 1:4 'To an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you,'
 - » This is consistent with our position Phil 3:20 'For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ,'



- Rom 8:24 ILG 'For by hope we were saved; but hope being seen is not hope; for what sees anyone, why also he hopes?'
 - 'we were saved'
 - Aorist passive indicative versions differ here
 - 'were', 'are', 'have been'
 - 'by **hope**'
 - Describe hope
 - Expectation
 - » For the believer the joyful and confident expectation of eternal salvation
 - According to this verse <u>if it is seen it is not hope</u>
 - » 'for what sees anyone, why also he hopes?'
 - What is our **hope** based on?



- Heb 11:1 'Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.'
 - But is our faith blind or a 'leap'?
 - » Søren Kierkegaard 'Faith begins where one knows and has experienced the limitations of rational thought. Therefore, it is a leap into a paradox: I know by not knowing; I believe because I cannot know but due to this unknowing, I have established a direct and unspeakable relationship with that which is beyond thinking, but which leads me in the relationship.'
 - I Pet 1:18-21!
- Rom 8:25 ILG "but if what we do not see we hope (for), through patience we eagerly expect."
 - 'but if what we do not see...' continues to describe hope
 - 'patience'
 - In context, 'we assiduously and patiently wait for' απεκδεχομεθα - apekdechomai



- Don't the terms assiduously (with diligence) and patiently seem conflicting?
- **Rom 8:19, 8:23**, Phil 3:20, Heb 9:28
- Compare that of the flesh with that of the Spirit
 - In the Spirit, do we have any choice?
- Describe your hope
 - Christ's return *Tit 2:13-15*, *I John 3:2-3*
 - Deliverance unto a resurrected body *Rom 8:23*
 - Spotless before Christ II Cor 5:21
 - Rewards II Tim 4:8
 - Deliverance from Satan, \sin , death I Cor 15:54
 - Companionship with the body of Christ *Heb 12:22,23*
 - Eternity with God *Heb 6:19,20*
- How can/does the hopeless soul respond?
