present, indicative, active form

joins in to help - synantilambanomai - usage notes: signifies "to take hold with at the side for assistance" (*syn*, "with," and "to help"); hence, "to take a share in, help in bearing, to help in general." Vine

see example in Luke 10:38-40 of Martha and Mary

What is our weakness in this passage?

weakness (noun) - astheneia - usage notes: lit., "want of strength" (a, negative, sthenos, "strength"), "weakness," indicating inability to produce results, is most frequently translated "infirmity," or "infirmities" Vine

Literal: the Spirit joins in to help the weakness (infirmity) of us

the Spirit also helps (or joins in to help) our weakness



weakness when used of Paul

1 Cor. 2:3 I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling,

2 Cor. 12:9 And He has said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is perfected in weakness." Most gladly, therefore, I will rather boast about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. :10 Therefore I am well content with weaknesses, with insults, with distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties, for Christ's sake; for when I am weak, then I am strong.

But every believer has no weakness in his position in Christ

Eph. 1:3 Blessed *be* the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly *places* in Christ,

Col. 2:9 For in Him all the fullness of Deity dwells in bodily form, :10 and in Him you have been made complete, and He is the head over all rule and authority;

for we do not know how to pray as we should

perfect, indicative, active

know - oida - usage notes: from the same root as *eidon*, "to see," is a perfect tense with a present meaning, signifying, primarily, "to have seen or perceived"; hence, "to know, to have knowledge of" Vine

Literal: we do not know the what we should pray for as is necessary

<u>expanded using perfect tense</u>: we did not know <u>the what</u> to pray for in the past and we continue not to know <u>the what</u> to pray for up into the present as we ought

see example of Paul's prayer in 2 Cor. 12:7-9

- Prayer under grace overview
 - new ground of prayer after the death, resurrection, and ascension of Christ and giving of the Holy Spirit
 - new relationship between the Godhead and the believer
 - joined to the Lord as members of His body
 - all believers are in a favored position in Christ
 - is one of the blessings of the believer's life under grace
- Prayer under grace will be "in Christ's name" John 16:24 & 26
 - Until now you have asked for nothing in My name;
 ask and you will receive
 - In that day you will ask in My name

- Prayer under grace involves the Father, Son and Holy Spirit
 - offered to the Father John 16:23
 - in the name of the Son John 16:23
 - in the power of the Holy Spirit Jude 1:20

Prayer in the New Testament

- Order in prayer is not arbitrary
 - prayer is to be "through Him" not "to Him"
 - prayer is to be "in My name"
 - prayer is to be "by Him" not "to Him"
 - by means of the Holy spirit

intercedes - hyperentynchanō - usage notes: "to make a petition" or "intercede on behalf of another" (*hyper*, "on behalf of," and entynchanō) Vine

compound word: intercedes + "on behalf" of or pleads + "on behalf of"

see Rom. 11:1-2 Elijah pleads with God

the Spirit Himself intercedes for us

groaning - stenagmos - usage notes: akin to stenazō "to groan" (of an inward, unexpressed feeling of sorrow), is used one other time in Acts 7:34, root word is used in Mark 7:34, 2 Cor. 5:1-4 Vine

Rom. 8:22 For we know that the whole creation groans and suffers the pains of childbirth together until now

Rom 8:23 - - - even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting eagerly for *our* adoption as sons, the redemption of our body.

What is the difference among the following: the Spirit groaning, our groaning and creation groaning?

the Spirit Himself intercedes for us



with groanings too deep for words

but the Spirit Himself comes to our rescue by interceding with unutterable groanings (Wuest)

unexpressed or unutterable groanings unutterable is the negative of to speak or to utter

God's grace is shown in that He intercedes for us without us asking

This intercession is similar to our groaning and creation groaning but without words

expanded using perfect tense: God knew the mind of the Spirit in the past and continues to know the mind of the Spirit up into the present

see 1 Cor. 2:10 -11

mind - phronēma - usage notes: denotes "what one has in the mind, the thought" (the content of the process expressed in phroneō, "to have in mind, to think"); or "an object of thought" Vine

see Rom 8:6 – 7 translated "mind set"
