James 1:5-8 God's Provision in Testing Your Faith, Part 1

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James 1:5-8 (NASB)

5 But if any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all generously and without reproach, and it will be given to him. 6 But he must ask in faith without any doubting, for the one who doubts is like the surf of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind. 7 For that man ought not to expect that he will receive anything from the Lord, 8 being a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways.

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Trials and Testing

Greek (peirasmos [trials])

a testing with a view toward failure; a solicitation to sin

Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials,

Greek (dokimion [testing])

a testing with a view toward approval; an opportunity to glorify God

Greek (hypomonē [endurance]) an abiding under

• knowing that the **testing** of your faith produces **endurance**.

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5a But if any of you lacks wisdom,

Greek (sophia [wisdom])

insight imparted from God in respect to the divine counsels; as conjoined with purity of heart and life

- But = moreover; continuing the thought
- James uses the word sophia again in 3:13, 15, 17
 - Contrasts earthly wisdom with Godly wisdom
 - See also 1 Corinthians 2
- What is the "wisdom" James speaks of here?
 - Is this the same wisdom described in the Old Testament?
- How does this relate to maturity discussed in verse?
 - Is this the teleos of our trials and tribulations?

5b let him **ask** of God, who gives to all **generously** and without **reproach**,

- Ask: to ask, beg, call for, crave, desire, require
 - Used 5 times in the book 1:5,6; 4:2,3 (2x)
- Wuest: let him keep on presenting his request
- What is the prerequisite for this request?
 - Reminder to whom is James speaking?
 - Who is the "all"?
- What is the character of the petitionee?
 - Generously: sincere, uncompounded, clear, without duplicity, bountifully, liberally
 - Reproach: to defame or disparage; to rail at
- What should we not ask of God?



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5c and it will be given to him. 6a But he must ask in faith without any doubting,

- What is the prerequisite of the giving?
 - Will God give only to those who ask?
- What is it that is given?
- What is the guarantee of this promise?
 - How can we know it will be done?

Greek (pistis [faith])

conviction of the truth of anything, belief

Specific word is used 16 times in the book



5c and it will be given to him. 6a But he must ask in **faith** without any **doubting**,

- What is the object of this faith?
 - Is it faith in who God is?
 - Is it faith in what God has revealed?
 - Is it faith that God can and will accomplish what He has promised?

Greek (diakrinō [doubting])

to be at variance, or strife, with one's self; hesitate; waver

- How does this "doubt" contrast with the "faith"?
 - What happens in the absence of faith?
 - See Hebrews 11:6
- Does God measure if our faith is "100%"?
 - Is this all or nothing?



6b for the one who doubts is like the surf of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind.

- What could be the cause of the vacillation?
- What are some events that could move us from a position of faith?
 - What is our "default" position?
- How does this relate to testing and trials?
 - What is it that is being "tried" and "tested"?
- What are some ways that the natural man describes the difficulties of life?
 - "What is the purpose of all this?"
